

The items we picked off the list were: WHITE SOCKS - 70 pr. various sizes & white only; BATH SOAP - 70 bars large soap; MICRO-WAVE POP CORN individually sealed packages. We will have boxes at each Church to drop items into. The closing date is SUNDAY DECEMBER 13. They will be delivered the following day. Please help us to fill the boxes. Remember, the Apostles Paul & Peter and the Prophet Jeremiah all went to prison because they knew God. May our prayers and actions help prisoners come to know God also! — Deacon Richard
